Eike Albrecht is professor for public law, in particular environmental and planning law at Brandenburg University of Technology Cottbus-Senftenberg (BTU) since 2004. He has studied law in Freiburg and Bonn (1988-1994) followed by a two year mandatory counsellor education at the District Court in Stuttgart (1995-1997), including a three month stay abroad at a law firm in Eugene, OR (USA). He holds a doctorate degree in law of University of Leipzig since 2002. His research is focused on environmental law, including international, European and national environmental law, and in the field of critical infrastructure, e.g. energy and digitalisation. He was responsible for numerous international research projects in Eastern Europe (Czech Republic, Hungary, Ukraine, Russia, Poland), Western Balkan (Macedonia, Northern Greece), the Middle East (Syria, Lebanon, Oman, Iraq) and Sub-Sahara Africa (Cameroon, Ruanda, Mozambique), and was involved in several practitioner focused EU- and German projects in Poland, Romania, Montenegro, in Syria and in Cameroon. He is author of numerous publications in academic journals and has edited several books on international environmental challenges, e.g. climate change and climate refugees, sustainable value chains and environmental management, transformation and digitalisation.

He serves in various academic positions, e.g. Dean of the Faculty for Business, Law and Social Sciences at BTU (2016-2022), head of two postgraduate study courses "Business Law for Technological Enterprises – M.B.L." and "Forensic Sciences and Engineering (M.Sc.)"; member of the Ethic's Board of BTU, etc. Since 2020 he is Co-Director of the Centre for Law and Administration of BTU, a central research unit of the university with focus on law and administration science with a focus on Poland and other countries of Eastern Europe and on the transformation process in the Lusatia coal region.
